

Bobsled

Bobsled (AKA bobsleigh) is a winter sport where teams race down a narrow, winding, and steeply banked ice track in a specially designed sled. winning team is the one with the lowest total score after a series of runs.

SPOTLIGHT ON: Vonetta

Flowers

Born: October 29, 1973.

Birthplace: Birmingham, Alabama.

Known for: First African American athlete to win a gold medal in the Winter Olympics (2002).

In college, Vonetta Flowers was a star sprinter and long jumper. She hoped to make the Summer Olympics. But she failed to make the team. So, she turned to bobsledding. Almost immediately, she found success as a brakes woman.

At the 2002 Winter Olympics in Salt Lake City, Utah (USA), Vonetta, along with driver Jill Bakken, won the gold medal in the two-woman event. She became the first African American woman to win a gold medal in the Winter Olympics.

15 Years, 128 Days

Age of USA bobsledder Tom Doe in 1928, where he won a silver medal, the youngest medalist in bobsled history.



The name "bobsled" originated from early racers who would bob (or shake) their heads back and forth in the sled to try to increase speed. They no longer need to do that.



In 1988, a bobsled team from the tropical island of Jamaica competed in the Winter Olympics for the first time. The Jamaican bobsled team will compete in the 2026 Winter Olympics.

Curling

Curling is a team sport played on a sheet of ice where two teams slide heavy, polished granite stones toward a target called a "house." The objective is **CURLING 2026** to score points by getting your At a Glance team's stones closer to the **Events** center of the house than the Men's curling opponent's stones. SPOTLIGHT ON: Sandra

Schmirler

Born: June 11, 1963.

Birthplace: Saskatchewan,

Canada.

Died: May 2, 2000.

Known for: Leading Canada's women's team to its first Olympic gold in 1998.

Her nickname was Schmirler the Curler. At the 1998 Winter Olympics in Nagano, Japan, she "skipped" (or captained) her Canadian team to a gold medal. It was the first year women's curling was a medal sport at the Winter Olympics.

Before that, she captured three World Curling Championships in 1993, 1994, and 1997. In 2019, she was named one of the two great Canadian female curlers in history and was later inducted into the World Curling Federation Hall of Fame.

42 pounds (19 kg)

The average weight of curling stones. Curlers say the best stones come from granite found on a small island off the coast of Scotland.



WHAT DOES
"SWEEPING" DO IN A
GAME OF CURLING? WHY
IS IT IMPORTANT?

Sweeping does several things. Sweeping (or brushing) slightly melts the ice in front of the stone. That creates a thin layer of water, which helps the stone move more easily and farther. It also helps the stone move in a straighter line.

Ice Hockey

Ice hockey is a fast-paced team sport played on an ice rink where two teams of skaters use sticks to shoot a hard rubber puck into the opponent's net. The winner is the team that scores more goals than the opposing team by the end of three 20-minute periods.

SPOTLIGHT ON: The 1980 US Hockey Team

When: 1980 Winter Olympics. **Where**: Lake Placid, NY, USA.

Known for: Upset victory over the Soviet

Union.

Everyone figured the Soviet Union would win the gold medal at the 1980 Winter Olympics. After all, the Soviet Union was a four-time gold medalist. It had won the gold medal in five of the previous six Winter Olympic Games.

By contrast, the United States team was composed mostly of amateur players with only four players with minimal minor-league experience.

Yet, the United States achieved an upset victory, winning 4-3. The victory became known as the "Miracle on Ice."

Hockey pucks are made from hard rubber. Freezing them before a game keeps them from bouncing during play, which could hurt players or spectators. But frozen hockey pucks thaw easily. So, an average NHL game uses as many as twelve pucks.

Short Track Speed Skating

Short track speed skating is a sport where multiple skaters race against each other on a small, indoor oval track. Skaters compete against one another, with the first to cross the finish line winning.

SPOTLIGHT ON: Apolo Ohno

Born: May 22, 1982.

Birthplace: Seattle, Washington, USA. **Known for:** The most decorated U.S. Winter Olympian with eight overall medals.

Apolo Ohno began speed-skating training full-time in 1996 at the age of 14. A year later, in 1997, he became the youngest US national champion. Many medals followed.

In 2002, at the Winter Olympics in Salt Lake City Utah, USA, Ohno won his first gold medal in the 1500 m race. He also took home a silver medal in the 1000 m.

In 2006, at the Winter Olympics in Turin, Italy, Ohno won a gold medal in the 500m race and bronze in both the 1000m and 5000m relay.


In 2010, at the Winter Olympics in Vancouver, British Columbia, Canada, Ohno took home silver in the 1500m race and bronze in both the 1000m and 1500m relay. In 2019, Ohno was inducted into the U.S. Olympic Hall of Fame

They may look the same, but they are very different. Here are just a few of the differences:

Competition: Speed Skating: Two athletes compete at the same time; after everyone has raced, the one with the fastest time wins. **Short Track**: Four to six athletes compete in a series of rounds. The fastest finishers progress to the later rounds.

Events: Speed Skating: 14 (7 for men; 7 for women). **Short Track**: 9 (4 for men; 4 for women; 1 mixed team).

The Track: Speed Skating: 400 meters long; Short Track: 111.12 meters.

Risk: The risk of falling in short track speed skating is much higher than in speed skating.



Freestyle Skiing

Freestyle skiing involves performing acrobatic stunts and tricks such as flips, spins, and slides in various disciplines, including moguls, aerials, and slopestyle.

SPOTLIGHT ON: Eileen Feng Gu (AKA by her Chinese name Gu Ailing)

Born: September 3, 2003.

Birthplace: San Francisco, California, USA.

Known for: At age 18, the youngest Olympic champion in freestyle skiing in

Olympic history.

Born in the United States, Eileen Gu has competed for China in halfpipe, slopestyle, and big air events since 2019. At the 2022 Winter Olympics in Beijing, China, Gu won gold medals in big air and halfpipe and a silver medal in slopestyle. She is the first freestyle skier to win three medals at a single Winter Olympics.


Mogul skiing involves skiing a course filled with bumps (moguls) and performing tricks. **Aerial skiing** focuses on high-flying jumps flips and spins before landing.

Slopestyle skiing features a course with various obstacles like rails, jumps, and boxes.

Halfpipe skiing takes place in a U-shaped ramp where skiers perform tricks.

Big air skiing involves performing the most impressive tricks off a single, huge jump.

Ski Jumping

Ski jumping is a winter sport where athletes ski down a ramp, launch into the air, and aim to fly as far as possible before landing. The skiers are judged on both the distance of their jump and their style, which includes body position.

SPOTLIGHT ON: Anders Haugen

Born: October 24, 1988. **Birthplace:** Norway.

Died: April 14, 1984 (age 95).

Known for: The first and, as of 2022, only American to win an Olympic medal for ski

jumping.

In 1909, at the age of 21, Anders Haugen emigrated (or came) to the United States from his home in Norway. In 1920, he set the world record for ski jumping distance of 65.23 meters (214 ft). In 1924, at the first Winter Olympics, Haugen placed fourth in the individual large hill ski jumping event. However, years later, in 1974, a sports historian discovered an error in the scoring. As a result, Haugen was awarded the bronze medal. He was 85 years old.

The main difference has to do with the K-point (the point where the hill begins to flatten out). The K-point of the normal hill ranges from 85m to 99m (approximately 279 feet to 325 feet). The K-point of the large hill ranges from 100m to 180m (approximately 328 feet to 591 feet). Jumpers are awarded points for every meter they travel beyond the K-point.
